

Lent to Easter: Over the Lenten Season, sisters and associates across SND USA

engaged in projects that continue to reach out in service to our neighbors, especially those who are vulnerable. Sisters of the California region gave cards to juvenile defendants, ages 13-18 at Dorothy Kirby Center, a juvenile detention center located in LA County (top left photo). Sisters of Notre Dame of the Toledo region, joined by other religious communities of northwest Ohio, sponsored the 4th Annual Catholic Sisters Week Food Drive. The food drive benefited Toledo Seagate Food Bank. Also in



Toledo, the sisters hosted an Easter Egg Hunt for children of "Mom's House," a childcare center available to assist low-income, single mothers in completing their high school, technical school, or college education, and provided baskets of Easter foods for their moms (top right). In Chardon, Lenten projects included writing hope-filled notes of encouragement and care to the men at Grafton Correctional Institution. There are 1,700 men at the facility and each man received a card, along with an Equal Exchange fair trade chocolate bar. The women at the Northeast Reintegration Center received bags with warm socks and hand lotion. The sisters assembled 700 bags in an afternoon (bottom left). In Covington, sisters, associates, and SND employees put together blessing bags consisting of hygiene items, fast food gift cards, and some snacks and water for local residents who are homeless (bottom right). These projects helped us move into Easter joy.

Sisters and Associates offer welcome, friendship to refugee families

A committee of CDP Sisters Alice Gerdeman, Mary Jennings, and Margie Verhoff and CDP Associates Donna Esposito, Ginny Kane and Robin Kelly has been trained by Kentucky Refugee Ministries (KRM) to help prepare them in aiding refugee families arriving in Northern Kentucky to become more accustomed to their new environment during their first few months here. Among other things, committee members help prepare the family's living space before their arrival by gathering some basic furniture and stocking simple essentials for their cupboards; they accompany family members to medical exams and grocery stores as needed; they help the new arrivals learn English, connect to their new community, and provide simple opportunities for the children to play and the adults to relax. Committee members don't know the family's story but are happy to be of service and to be the family's friends. CDP Associate Terri Muenich has also joined the group, which most recently has assisted two families from Somalia.
