
St. Walburg Monastery holds 166 years of history within its archives—stories of 329 Benedictine Sisters who lived, prayed, and served in schools, parishes, and ministries across generations.

We are now preparing a portion of our archives to be housed at the Women Religious Archives Collaborative (WRAC) Heritage Center in Cleveland, where they will be preserved and shared as part of a national collection celebrating the legacy of women religious.



Sr. Cathy Bauer led the **S.E.E.K. Confirmation Preparation Program** for 8th graders at **Saint Agnes School**. As part of the program, students walked from **Be Concerned** to the **Emergency Shelter of NKY** and on to **Welcome House, Inc.**, learning firsthand about homelessness, food insecurity, and the challenges faced by those in need.

Srs. Cathy and Dorothy spent two powerful days in **Selma and Montgomery**, visiting historic sites of the 1965 Voting Rights March, the **Edmundite Missions**, and the **Equal Justice Initiative's Legacy Museum and Memorials**. The sisters are **once again holding their Pies for a Purpose sale for Thanksgiving**. We will be offering pumpkin, pecan, and apple pies. Guided by the **Benedictine value of service**, all proceeds will benefit Hispanic immigrants.

October 1 marked our founding 175 years ago in Coesfeld, Germany. One of our celebrations was in Rome. An international group of SND's gathered at the Vatican during the Jubilee of Consecrated Life and presented Pope Leo with a Coesfeld Cross, our legacy from our first two sisters, Hilligonde Wolbring (foundress) and Elisabeth Kuhling.



In Covington, we celebrated with Notre Dame Academy both the 175th anniversary of the Congregation and the 120th anniversary since NDA opened its doors. Ms. Lauren Hilton was also installed as the fourth president of NDA at the conclusion of the liturgy.

Of course, we could not let the fall season come and go without an October fest and a Halloween party. Sisters gathered at Lourdes Hall on October 17 to celebrate Oktoberfest with German foods and songs. On October 26 we celebrated Halloween.

October 25: Grief Session About 25 sisters gathered for a presentation with Donna McCartney, LISW, a bereavement counselor and community outreach coordinator at the Goldstien Family Grief Center of Hospice of Cincinnati. This workshop was designed to provide us with the knowledge, tools, and support needed to navigate the grieving process—both for us and for those we care about. Donna explored with us the emotional, physical, and psychological effects of grief. The program also offered insight into how to support others who are grieving, fostering empathy and connection in times of loss.

Commemoration of the Faithful Departed On the Feast of All Soul's Day, the family members of our deceased sisters were invited to celebrate their loved ones during a 2:00 p.m. Mass at St. Agnes. A token of remembrance was given to family members in the Service of Remembrance/Litany of Names at the conclusion of the Mass. A reception followed in the undercroft. Everyone appreciates coming together once more as a Notre Dame family.

Online introduction to the Discernment Process –November 8 To prepare for the selection of our next provincial leader, the province initiated a discernment process on November 8. During the one-hour Zoom presentation, the following issues were shared:

- Dispositions to cultivate during collective discernment
- The synodal methodology we will be using
- Timeline for national/regional discussions
- Sr. Margaret Gorman, the current provincial, provided a summary of the “state of the province” and further considerations.

We invite all to join in praying with us on this journey of discernment that will culminate sometime in March with installation of the new provincial leadership team scheduled for July 5, 2026.

CDP

The Sisters of Divine Providence have found a challenge, a call, and a gift in advocating for immigrants and refugees. Early in October, we hosted a Honk and Wave in which, positioning ourselves at a busy intersection, Sisters, Associates, and neighbors rallied in support of immigrants, refugees, and allies. We had a wonderfully positive response. Also, to commemorate the Feast of Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini, we had two opportunities for prayer and protest. Several Sisters and Associates participated in an event at the St. Mary's Garden at the Cathedral sponsored by the Intercommunity Sisters Peace & Justice Committee. Two other sisters joined several religious communities and a group of

Xavier University students to pray the rosary outside the ICE Facility in Blue Ash, Ohio. Our Providence spirituality calls us to demonstrate God's tender care, particularly to vulnerable people, and we are grateful to be able to advocate for immigrants in these and other ways.



Another meaningful gathering was our annual All Souls Day remembrance of our deceased Sisters and Associates. We prayed and sang, told stories, and remembered them with love and gratitude.

We've also had some fun this fall, and Sisters and staff and Holy Family marked this spooky holiday with a festive Halloween party.





Lastly, we are so grateful for the volunteers who serve alongside us, and we've had some wonderful groups come to Holy Family lately. In October, we partnered with Thomas More University for Saints Serve, a campus-wide volunteer day for students, faculty, and staff. They made our garden so beautiful! Two of the students who came also regularly visit and play cards with sisters. We also had a group of young women lead us in pumpkin decorating, which was fun. We are so grateful for their service and presence with us!



To commemorate the Jubilee of Consecrated Life, a group of Sisters from three of our Northern Kentucky congregations journeyed together to Alabama for a “local pilgrimage.” The pilgrims who participated were Sisters Dorothy Schuette, OSB, Cathy Bauer, OSB, Ruth Lubbers, SND, Jean Menke, CDP, Judith Riese, CDP, and Leslie Keener, CDP. An essential part of our journey was the beautiful hospitality offered to us by CDP Sisters Mary Cashman and Ginny Patrick in Selma.

As pilgrims on this journey of hope, we joined in the spirit of those who marched from Selma to Montgomery in 1965 for rights, peace, and freedom. As we visited the historic sites and reflected on the impact of the Civil Rights Movement, we also prayed for all those who experience oppression, violence, and bigotry in our day. In addition, we had a chance to visit the Edmundite

Missions to see the amazing and important work they do — education, social services, nutrition, medical services, clothing, and more. We also took time to pray and reflect together along the way, noticing the ways that God is speaking to each one of us through this experience. What a meaningful time of community, solidarity, prayer, and hope!
